

DELAWARE COUNTY COMMISSIONER'S MEETING MINUTES

November 26, 2024

The Board of County Commissioners of Delaware County met in Regular Session at 9:00 a.m. on November 26, 2024. The agenda was posted November 25, 2024, at 8:27 a.m. and placed in the kiosk on the courthouse lawn as well as the county website. Members of the Board present were Commissioner David Poindexter, Chairman, Commissioner David Beck-Member and County Clerk Barbara Barnes -Secretary. The Board of Delaware County Commissioners is hereby authorized to act on the following items:

The meeting was called to order by Commissioner Poindexter followed by the flag salute and roll call. Commissioner Callihan was absent.

AGENDA #5 - Not needed as no monthly reports were submitted by officers.

AGENDA #6 - A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to approve opening the floor for citizen's participation or comments. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. There were none.

AGENDA #7- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to hear Human Resources report by HR Director Vicki Cossiart. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

Cossairt said the county has 137 employees today. She has been working on retirement plans for two present employees and two past employees. Cossairt said longevity pay checks were distributed last Thursday. She said safety bonuses will be included in the Dec. 15 paychecks as safety pay must be made with the payroll.

Cossairt said new legislation took effect Nov. 18 for CDL drivers who have a positive alcohol or drug test. Their license will be degraded from CDL to a regular license. She said several employees have asked if a rendering of the new fair barn can be placed somewhere for the public to see. The artist rendering is on the county website at okcounties.org under the gallery tab.

AGENDA #8- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to open the floor for new business. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. There was none.

AGENDA #9- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to sign affidavits for November 27 payroll. Roll call: Commissioner Callihan-yes; Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #10- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to accept a bid from Gary Plemons in the amount of \$20 for Flint Ridge 1 Amended Lot 24, Block 2, Fox Creek Area on behalf of the County Treasurer. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexteryes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #11- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to approve amended REAP grant application for District #1 on behalf of Lendonwood Gardens. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #12- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to open sealed bids on six-month road materials for the Delaware County Highway Departments with possible acceptance now or at a later date. County Bid #24-25/03. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. Bids were opened from APAC, Chad Crank, Muskogee Sand, Warren Cat, Benton County Stone, Longan Construction, Kemp Stone, The Railroad Yard, Dub Ross, Excavation Unlimited, Pryor Stone, Yellowhouse, Pryor Asphalt, and Coastal Energy. Baker said she will put a list of the bids together and send it to the barns for review by Monday.

AGENDA #13- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to table this item to surplus vehicles on behalf of the Sheriff's Office until the next regularly scheduled meeting Dec. 3. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #14- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to approve contract with AAVCOR per Human Resources Director Vicki Cossairt. Cossairt explained this is the company which does drug screens for the county. She said AAVCOR has done a good job and this is a standard contract we have used before. The only difference is a \$2 increase on non-DOT testing. Cossairt said ADA Patterson reviewed the contract. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #15- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to sign resolution for order of incorporation for the Town of Cleora. Debbie Bullard, who has worked on this project from the first, said there will be a January meeting to select a mayor and five-member board of directors. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #16- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to discuss with possible action a declaration of emergency concerning completion of the E-911 call center. Networking installation is sub-standard and will not be ready for transition by Dec. 15, 2024. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. Poindexter said this concerns wiring the consoles. Longacre said Stolz looked at the work which has been done and tested 104 terminals. There was a 33 percent failure rate and a 40 percent near failure rate. Poindexter stressed the problem is not with the contractor, Stolz, but with the subcontractor. Pewitt said the wiring is essential to 911 and the present system cannot be extended to the new center without this wiring. Since the entire county's dispatch has been moved into the small space where a portion of the county has been dispatched before, Longacre said operation after Dec. 15 would be possible but difficult because there is not enough room.

Pewitt asked if the system is essential for public safety and if the wiring is not fixed it constitutes a disaster. Longacre answered yes to both questions. E-911 Board Chairman Carl Tesreau said the contractor believes the easiest way to fix the wiring is to remove what has been done

and start fresh. Beck said if there was a code inspector for this wiring, it could never pass. A motion was made by Poindexter, and seconded by Beck to declare the wiring a disaster. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #17- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to discuss with possible action solutions to extend existing 911 call center past Dec. 15, 2024. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. Pewitt asked Longacre to explain problems with extending use of the current system. Longacre said the 100-year-old building has a small room that was cramped for two dispatchers. Four are working now and the stations are not set up for that. Longacre said his team can keep working in the makeshift environment for the short term, but it will be difficult. He said working in that environment presents a danger to the public. A motion was made by Poindexter and seconded by Beck to acknowledge that no solution exists beyond getting into the new building as soon as possible. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #18- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to discuss with possible action termination or modification of existing contract for networking installation in county 911 call center. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. Poindexter said the current sub-contractor is aware of the problem and agrees he should stop working on this project. Tesreau said he would like to modify that statement to reflect the sub-contractor keep working on the doors and camera system which are almost complete. Poindexter made a motion, seconded by Beck, to terminate the portion of the contract pertaining to the console network. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #19- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to discuss with possible action emergency award of standard contract to complete/replace networking installations at 911 call center for completion and validation before De. 15, 2024. Bids to be solicited by vendor quote process. Specifications are as previously utilized with existing sub-contractor. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. Pewitt asked the purchasing agent if she got quotes. Baker said the vendor quote sheet was used since an emergency had been declared. She called Stolz Communication, Betts Telecom and Wyandotte Technology. Stolz and Betts responded, Wyandotte declined to bid. Both bids were the same to clean up and rebuild the system at \$39,835.49. Tesreau said he believes either bid would be fine, but Betts has worked with the contractor before. A motion was made by Poindexter and seconded by Beck to accept the bid from Betts Telecom in the amount of \$39,835.49. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. Poindexter told Barnes it is his understanding the ARPA funds generated some interest which can be used to pay for this bill. Barnes said she did not know and would have to find out. Parker said she was holding an email from David Floyd, the attorney who administers the ARPA funds, saying the interest may be used in any way the BOCC sees fit, and it appears there is no time limit to using the money. Pewitt suggested an agenda item be added next week concerning payment.

AGENDA #20- A motion was made by Commissioner Beck and seconded by Commissioner Poindexter to adjourn the meeting at 10:06 a.m. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.
