

## **DELAWARE COUNTY COMMISSIONER MEETING MINUTES**

## September 19, 2023

The Board of County Commissioners of Delaware County met in Regular Session at 9:00 a.m. on September 19, 2023. The agenda was posted September 18, 2023, at 8:22 a.m. and placed in the kiosk on the courthouse lawn well as the county website. Members of the Board present were Commissioner David Poindexter-Chairman, Commissioner Jake Callihan-Member, Commissioner David Beck-Member. County Clerk Barbara Barnes was absent. Barnes was represented by her first deputy, Michaele Baker. The Board of Delaware County Commissioners is hereby authorized to act on the following items:

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Poindexter followed by the flag salute and roll call. Barnes was absent.

AGENDA #1 - A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to determine that notice of meeting and agenda for this meeting was properly posted in accordance with the Oklahoma Open Meeting Act. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #2-A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to approve introductions and announcements. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. In addition to the Commissioners and Commissioners' Secretary Kathy Parker, Carolyn Boothe, Human Resources Director Vicki Cossairt, Emergency Management Director Jeff Reeves, Treasurer Treasa Earp, Jamie Bodine and Bill Shaw of BOLT, Aaron Saddler of TeleComp, Election Board Secretary Crystal January, Brooke Downing and Penny Meredith of OSU, and Michael Gordon of REC introduced themselves.

AGENDA #5 - A motion was made by Commissioners Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to approve all monthly reports submitted by officers. Reports were submitted by the Court Clerk. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #6 - A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck for approval of citizen's participation or comments. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. There were none.

AGENDA #7 -A motion was made by Commissioners Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to hear report by Human Resources Director Vicki Cossairt. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

Cossairt said the county had 136 employees Tuesday. Since her last report, three hires have been made, there have been no terminations or exits. The county has 15 full-time job openings posted, but Cossairt said five of the openings are for sheriff's employees and stay posted all the time.

Cossairt said some Covid cases have been reported in the community. She said while symptoms previously included loss of taste and smell, the new variant presents as allergy symptoms. Cossairt said anyone who is ill should have a Covid test and if it is positive, the employee must stay off work five days. She urged employees with sick time to share with those who have none. Cossairt urged everyone to get up to date on the many vaccines and boosters available.

Cossairt said employees all have cell phones but they should not be on Facebook during working hours. Cossairt said she has gotten calls about employees who are constantly on Facebook during the work day. Cossairt warned there are many internet scams going around and to never send money to anyone as a result of an internet post unless you first confirm the person is who they claim to be.

AGENDA #8- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to open the floor for new business. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried. Poindexter talked about bids he just received from the undersheriff for a motor and a transmission for two different sheriff's vehicles. Sheriff Beck said the motor issue can be addressed later but the transmission should be done immediately. This transmission will be for a 2017 Dodge that is black and unmarked. Sheriff Beck said the truck had 160,000 miles on it when he got it to drive. Poindexter asked about the warranty for the transmission. Undersheriff Nick O'Neal said the warranty is three years or 36,000 miles. Callihan asked the sheriff if he has no money. The sheriff said he has begun to receive the sales tax money from the ballot issue the voters approved. O'Neal said there is \$30,000 in use tax that was payment from insurance on two vehicles his employees wrecked. The money is in use tax because the vehicles were paid for not out of the sheriff's funds, but out of county funds, so the insurance money was returned to the account it was taken from in the first place.

A motion was made by Poindexter and seconded by Beck to pay \$6,742 to Vance Dodge to replace the transmission. The money will come from the use tax account. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #9- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to approve highway cash for October. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #10- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to approve blanket purchase orders for October. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #11- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to receive and forward to ACCO a tort claim from Deeya Adam in District 2. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #12- A motion was made by Commissioner Poindexter and seconded by Commissioner Callihan to pay invoice from Craig County Detention Center in the amount of \$50 for child care services for the month of August. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

Funding is to be provided by Cherokee Nation persons interested in submitting a bid are to contact Michaele Baker, P. A., located in the Delaware County Clerk's Office, Jay, Okla. Bids will be opened and reviewed in meeting dated October 10, 2023, at 9 a.m. Bids will be received no later than 3 p.m. in the County Clerk's Office, Jay, Okla., on October 6, 2023. Board reserves the right to accept/reject any and all bids and the right to re-advertise. County bid #23-24/09. Emergency Manager Jeff Reeves said this is an EMS grant from the Cherokee Nation in the amount of \$50,000. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #14- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to advertise for sealed bids on highway salt materials for the county highway department through April 30, 2024. AGENDA #15- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to receive and file a copy of Certificate of Liability Insurance and current list of Board of Directors and Officers for the Tiff City Volunteer Fire Department as follows: David Hardesty – Chairman; Jacob Hardesty – Vice Chairman; Richard Huston, John Moore – members; Mike Roark – Treasurer; Fire Chief – Nate Walter; Asst. Chief – Stan Mersman; Requisitioning Officers – John Moore, Barbara Barnes; Receiving Officers – Jacob Hardesty, Nate Walter; Inventory Officers – Stan Mersman, Kevin Sherman. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #16- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to discuss with possible action phone system quotes with TeleComp and BOLT. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

Bodine said she was unable to get any phone bill information from Grand Telephone as they said each office must provide their PIN number and separate authorization. Based on the system BOLT set up at Jay Schools, she thinks the phone bills would be significantly cheaper, and she also suggested some of the courthouse numbers might not be needed. She said the Grand Telephone bill decreased substantially at Jay Schools when the BOLT system was installed. Beck asked how many lines are included at the courthouse and Bodine said 24 lines are billed. Poindexter said BOLT will be trunking with Grand Telephone which will provide two sources of service, but if BOLT is chosen, Grand Telephone will still be paid for the phone numbers. Shaw said moving the phones from copper lines to fiber optic ones will increase the quality of the service substantially. He said the internet is separate now to each office and not a single network, so the only option was to completely separate the phones from the internet line. He said the network could be combined, but that would not be cost effective.

Saddler said TeleComp uses a Vizio map that is a separate network for the phones which cuts out the middle man (Grand Telephone). New switches will be placed in each office. None of the Grand Telephone numbers will be retained if TeleComp is chosen. The main number to the courthouse will change and all calls to the courthouse will come in to that number, then be sent to the proper office. Poindexter said the copper lines will eventually go away, so replacing them with some other system is a now or later proposition. He said Grand Telephone does not provide good service. Case in point is not helping get information for Bodine. No one knows their PIN number because the phones were set up so many years ago. "What we had is going away," Poindexter said.

Commissioner Beck asked Sheriff Beck what he thinks. Sheriff Beck said both quotes will achieve the same thing, but the main differences are price and whether or not the old numbers are retained.

Callihan wants to keep the phone numbers. He said he called Stephens County who got the TeleComp system, and they are very dissatisfied.

Saddler said that was the old system and no good. He said Stephens County was the first one TeleComp did. He said the county refused to get separate networks for the phones and internet and that is what caused the problem. "Kellpro (the software company for county records and payroll) is a software company that dabbles in IT and TeleComp is an IT company," Saddler said. "Separate networks will keep all these problems from happening."

Shaw said at some point, Grand Telephone may give the county its phone numbers, but now they are in control of the numbers.

Callihan asked Reeves if he had anything to add. He did not. Callihan said his concern is changing the county phone numbers. "If we can get Google to straighten out the number, the internal ones will be the same," Poindexter said. "There will be one number for the public to call and that will be new. By leasing the equipment with TeleComp, we will keep up with what works because stuff becomes obsolete so fast now." Saddler said TeleComp offers free upgrades.

Commissioner Beck asked who monitors the system. "Either company does that," Poindexter said. "It's in their contracts." Callihan said he would like one more week to research. He asked Saddler for the contact information to other counties TeleComp serves. He said he knows the school is happy with BOLT because his wife is a counselor there. Bodine said she can provide other references.

AGENDA #17- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to discuss with possible action Election Board Secretary participation in longevity and safety award payments. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

Cossairt said safety pay has been done for several years and longevity pay started last year. "This comes up every year, whether Crystal gets this, so I want the commissioners to confirm one way or the other," Cossairt said.

Cossairt said the opinion of previous District Attorneys has been that the Election Board Secretary does not get safety or longevity pay, but January said Cherokee County is paying the extra compensation to their Election Board Secretary.

Cossairt said there is a specific statute for the pay of election board secretaries. The state pays for the salary, but will not reimburse the county for extra pay, so if the commissioners decide to give the election board secretary longevity and safety pay, it will come from the county's budget. So, Cossairt said, the question is whether it is legal for the appointed position of election board secretary to get this extra pay. Once again, Cossairt took the question to the District Attorney's office and Assistant District Attorney Marianna McKnight gave the opinion that it is not illegal.

Election Board Secretary is a hybrid position, Cossairt said. The secretary is appointed by a legislator and treated as an elected official sometimes and an employee some times. While the state sets the salaries for both the elected and appointed officials, the elected officials are excluded from extra compensation, but the BOCC can decide if they wish to pay extra compensation to the appointed secretary. "So, it can go either way," Cossairt said, "but it won't be reimbursed by the state. So, the BOCC needs to decide once and for all." Cossairt said January accrues no sick time or vacation like elected officials, but is treated as an employee in the retirement system. "She is treated as an elected for all intents and purposes, but there is a crack in the door of the statute if you want to pay her more," Cossairt said. Cossairt thanked McKnight for her research and opinion,

Callihan made the motion to include the Election Board Secretary in longevity and safety award pay. Poindexter seconded the motion on the condition that the pay was not retroactive. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #18- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to approve an intrafund transfer from Highway CIRB-MV to Highway M&O in the amount of \$40,000 per District 2 Commissioner Jake Callihan. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.

AGENDA #19- A motion was made by Commissioner Callihan and seconded by Commissioner Beck to adjourn at 10:04 a.m. Roll call: Commissioner Poindexter-yes; Commissioner Callihan-yes; and Commissioner Beck-yes. Motion carried.
